The Potchefstroom Law Clinic (hereinafter The Law Clinic is an organisation committed referred to as the Law Clinic) was officially to legal education and access to justice and established on 5 August 1981 and form part operates in the Provinces of the North-West of the Faculty of Law of the North-West Uni- and Mpumalanga. versity.

#### The Law Clinic is involved with the following projects:

#### Legal education:

- students within the LLB Programme of the NWU.
- Short courses involving legal practitioners, paralegals, social workers and others.
- Training to members of the communities within the areas where the Law Clinic • Walk-in-clients at the Ikageng satellite office operates.
- Training to School learners about their basic Walk-in-clients at our offices situated in human rights.

#### Legal aid services:

• The practical legal training of final year law The Law Clinic renders free legal aid services to poor and indigent people through the following activities:

- Walk-in-clients at our offices situated in Potchefstroom.
- of the Potchefstroom Magistrate's Court.
- Nelspruit.
- Back-up legal services to communities at community-based paralegal advice offices situated in the North-West Province (North-

West Access to Justice Cluster).

- Back-up legal services to communities at community-based paralegal advice offices situated in the Mpumalanga Province (Mpumalanga Access to Justice Cluster).
- Legal representation to children in the North-West Province (Child Justice Unit).

#### **Capacity building programmes:**

These programmes are directed towards, inter alia, paralegals and members of the community to develop their legal skills and operational capacity to practice such skills in the communities where they operate.

Within these activities the Law Clinic co-operates with a number of organisations such as Legal Aid South Africa, government departments, provincial paralegal organisations, different NGO's and CBO's to be successful and to fulfil its purpose.

Furthermore, the Law Clinic receives funding from international and national donors, as described herein, to enable it to be involved in these activities. Without this funding the Law Clinic would not be able to conduct its activities.

Through its activities the Law Clinic wishes to improve the quality of life of the people in the Provinces of the North-West and Mpumalanga.

#### **Advisory services:**

The Law Clinic renders advisory services to community members to enhance a "rights based" community and to, instead of taking the law into their own hands, use the law to enforce their rights.

## **STUDENT** TRAINING Practical legal training

The Law Clinic places great emphasis on the conducts two practical legal training courses practical legal training of our students. These courses are compulsory for all final year law students at the Faculty of Law of the North

#### We present the following modules:

- IURI 414 (final year students, first semester) lecture of a minimum of one hour per week, for which a total of 234 students registered for this module on the Potchefsfroom Campus; and
- IURI 422 (final year students, second semester) for which a total of 228 students registered for this module on the Potchefsfroom Campus.

The students have to attend a practical session of two hours per week at the Law Clinic, amounting to approximately 20 hours per module. Students also have to attend a formal

which amounts to approximately 10 hours per module.

Ms Ninette Crous and Ms Awelani Thangavhuelelo (Lecturers at the NWU, Faculty of Law) are responsible for the theoretical component of these subjects, whilst the legal practitioners of the Law Clinic are responsible for the practical training sessions. The entire Law Clinic team is involved with and committed to providing students with the opportunity to enhance their practical legal skills.



#### Practical sessions include:

- Simulated consultations and how to take instructions from a client
- Professional and ethical conduct
- File management
- Drafting of correspondence
- Drafting of pleadings
- Case analysis, legal research and drafting a legal opinion
- First appearances and postponements
- Trial advocacy and court etiquette
- Civil litigation (action and application procedures)
- Alternate Dispute Resolution
- Divorce, Maintenance and Domestic Violence
- Parental rights and responsibilities
- Child Justice Act
- Bail applications
- Pleas
- Mock-trials and Moot Court
- Sentencing
- Drafting bill of costs

The module marks are compiled from the practical work done, as well as a written test and examination. The practical work constitutes 60% of the final mark.

We believe that students must be enabled to obtain knowledge in all the different career possibilities available to them in the legal profession. As part of the Law Clinic's initiative to give students the true feeling of practice in the real world, local Magistrates, Attorneys, Prosecutors, Advocates and other legal professionals are invited to give lectures. This, as well as the community service projects as set out below, enables students to actively engage with different legal practitioners and to make an appropriate career choice.

### **Student Projects**

#### **Community service projects for final year law students**

The students that took part in this activity conducted a combined total of 1 089 hours of community service for 2018.

#### 2. Participation in the Magistrate's Court project

During the first semester 93 of the students The Law Clinic implemented the Magistrate's Court project in cooperation with Chief Magistrate Leshomo and Magistrate Barnard of the Potchefstroom Magistrate's Court.

attorneys and candidate attorneys (strategic conducted a combined total of 347 hours of community service for 2018.

#### 3. Community workshops

During April 2018 two students attended visits to community-based paralegal advice offices situated in Kanana (Orkney) and Jouberton (Klerksdorp) and assisted the attorney of the Law Clinic to conduct community workshops. The students that took part in this activity conducted a combined total of 17 hours of community service for 2018. Due to time constraints (students having to be out of Potchefstroom from 08:00 – 16:30) students could not take part in this project for the rest of the year.

In cooperation with STOP (Stop Trafficking of People), a registered non-profit organisation that aims to combat all aspects of human trafficking in South Africa, students were given the opportunity to present workshops to various schools situated in the Potchefstroom area. For the first semester 30 students and for the second semester 7 students took part took part in the STOP community project. The students who took part in this activity conducted a combined total of 189 hours of community service for 2018.

#### 4. Participation in any other service-learning project identified by the PC Law Clinic

#### 4.1 National Prosecuting Shadow Project

During the week of 25 to 29 June 2018 students were given the opportunity to attend court appearances with public prosecutors at the

Potchefstroom Magistrate's Court. 12 students took part in the project and assisted with the administrative tasks of the public prosecutors. Students contributed a combined total of 346 community service hours.

#### 4.2 Prison Alert project

Students attended prison visits with attorneys and paralegals of the Law Clinic, as well as school learners. The students were required to present workshops to the school learners on topics identified by the Law Clinic. During the first semester 30 students and during the second semester 7 students took part in this activity. The students who took part in this activity conducted a combined total of 155 hours of community service for 2018.

#### 4.3 Private law firms

Students were also allowed to do their community service hours at private law firms. The law firms were given guidelines detailing the type of activities the students should be involved in. The law firms were required to provide the Law Clinic with proof of the community service conducted. During 2018 102 students took part in this activity and conducted a combined total of 1 297.5 hours of community service for 2018.

## **CHILD** JUSTICE UNIT

he Child Justice Unit (CJU) was established in terms of a cooperation agreement with Legal Aid South Africa in July 2011 and has the following goals and objectives:


- Providing legal services to children

- Providing legal opinions to social workers and Children's Courts.

- Encouragement and promotion of accessible and child friendly Children's Courts
- Provide training and education to social workers, children and the community with a focus on children's rights

- The development of collaborative partnerships with other organizations that share the vision of the CIU.
- Prevent or end gross human rights violations and promote positive change in policies or actions of government or relevant non-state actors in the area of human rights
- Educate and/or train human rights victims, workers or defenders
- Monitor, seek redress for and/or report on human rights violations, including supporting victims of human rights abuses
- · Promote observance and implementation of international human rights standards
- · Promote and strengthen national or regional human rights institutions or mechanisms

### **Training: 2018**



### **North-West Access to Justice Cluster**

The cluster is a co-operation between various legal service providers and other organisations with the aim of providing access to justice and services to poor and marginalised people in rural and remote areas.

#### **Back-up legal services**

In 2018 the Law Clinic provided back-up legal services from to 10 community-based paralegal advice offices, namely: Bojanala, Jouberton, tion from the client, and forward it to the Law Lebaleng, Leeudoringstad, Lethabong Dropping Centre, Letlhabile, Jericho, Orkney, Boikhutso and Boikhutsong.

The Law Clinic, in co-operation with Legal Aid The main activities of the cluster include South Africa and various NGO's and CBO's back-up legal services to paralegal advice operates an Access to Justice Cluster in the offices, community workshops, networking and advocacy. The Law Clinic is acting as the secretariat of the NWAJC and handles all the administration and financial management of the Cluster.



In the case where a file is opened the paralegals assist in obtaining outstanding informa-Clinic. The paralegals also play an important role in providing feedback to clients when it is difficult to reach them.

#### **Community workshops**

The aim of the community workshops presented by the Law Clinic is to raise awareness within communities regarding basic human rights and responsibilities. These workshops are held at traditional and / or community-based paralegal advice offices throughout the North-West Province and aim to build capacity within the communities and paralegals of these traditional and/or community-based paralegal advice offices.

During this reporting period, the Law Clinic held 24 community workshops, reaching a total number of 495 members of the community.

The workshop themes were: domestic violence, maintenance, eviction, human rights, customary marriages, matrimonial consequences of marrying in and out of community of property, the administration of deceased estates, intestate succession, Unemployment Insurance Fund, pension and/or provident funds, Compensation for Occupational Injuries and Diseases Act, Road Accident Fund claims, children and women rights, child neglect, awareness about 16 days of activism of no violence against women and children and parental rights and responsibilities.

#### **School workshops**

During 2018, the Law Clinic presented 2 workshops to Grade 9 and 10 school learners of Boitshoko and Tlokwe Secondary Schools. The topics discussed during the workshops focused on children's rights and responsibilities, including sexual assault.

#### **Prison alert project**

The Prison Alert Project aims to prevent crime within the community and to raise awareness amongst school learners of the consequences of engaging in criminal activies.

School learners from various schools within the Potchefstroom area were taken to the Potchefstroom Remand Detention (previously unknown as Wilgeboom Correctional Services) situated outside of Potchefstroom for a one day visit. The learners are taken on a tour inside the prison and prisoners give motivational speeches to the learners to achieve the goals of the project. Final year law students are also involved in this project.




